# **Synopsis & Learning Outcomes of each strand**

Landscapes and Mindscapes: Connecting the Dots of Ubin Kok Heng Leun, Khong Weng Keong & Tan Beng Chiak

To the untrained eye, Ubin appears as a motley collection of quaint sights. This trail uncovers varied perspectives and contemporary interpretations of some of the island's cultural and physical (e.g., geological) markers. By exploring what Pulau Ubin means at different times and space, we will begin to appreciate what Ubin has to offer to enrich one's imagination (e.g., geographical, cultural, socio-economic, historical) and critical thinking skills in order to further a sense of place (e.g., needs, relationships, identities (e.g., "indigenous people of Ubin") and tensions) in our students.

### **Learning Outcomes**

At the end of the trail experience, participants will be able to:

- 1. identify and recognise interesting historical, cultural and physical features along the trail.
- 2. relate to the demographic, socio-economic and environmental changes and realities of Pulau Ubin.
- 3. relate to the impact that Ubin's transportation has on the perception and experience of the island as a place by its residents and visitors.
- 4. connect the relevance of and development in Pulau Ubin to narratives and aspirations about Singapore's national development and nation-building.
- 5. reframe Pulau Ubin as a place of significant (educational) value that can support inter-generational connections, sustainable development, and nation-building.

# **Ubin Resource - Mobility**

Mobility: on the move... to some where... for rest ... for some purpose ... to achieve a task... where mobility signifies change... where mobility signifies What moves, how they moves, when they move, why they move? Speed, tempo, rhythm, time, duration

Stop 1: Preparation to move:

- 1. The jetty...- the travellers, the people who works there
- 2. The time/the space

Stop 2: The Boat ride: an island moving... an isolation... a state of being leaving n while u are here... u change your set of mind (Hearing the audio)

# Stop 3: The Chinese village

- movement of people... what the village previously was where business daily livelihood are done... where ammunitions are kept... now where tourists make pit stop before they go to another place
- Now, who are these people? The Vietnamese, people from mainland, people from Malaysia, people who were not the original Ubin residents

# Stop 4: The Temple

- movement of god Dua Pek Gong, moving from hilltop to village square
- Doreen as people from mainland now coming to live here

Stop 5: Pekan Quarry - the net work of things moving - of Granites from the deep underground to the various parts of Singapore - how it evolves through time, then the site become covered with water about the underground (10:15am)

Stop 6: The Malay village - Kampong Sungai Durian

- Water point and the Well... the movement underground the water... the life source (Weng Kheong: about how water accumulates - the geography)
- How people move and live...

Stop 7: The Pekau Tree and the School n the Surau, Ghosts, Hantu Passing by: Chek Jawa - the tides, the migratory birds

# Connecting with Ubin villagers Dr Vivienne Wee, June Wong & Pillay P Krishnan

Pulau Ubin is the last inhabited island of Singapore with what is left of *kampung* life. The former population of some 2000 people before 1992 have dwindled to less than 150, with only 38 or so persons there every day. Nevertheless, the *kampung spirit* lives among the remaining villagers, as exemplified through their inherent trust of others, families helping each other through generations, neighbours sharing resources like their well water, sharing of each other's special skills like building a *kampung* house, crab catching etc.

Connecting with Ubin villagers means connecting with the kampung way of life where sharing is a norm of everyday life.

# **Learning Outcomes**

At the end of the trail experience, participants will be able to:

- 1. experience what it means to be part of a living and learning community who are sensitive to their daily environment.
- 2. learn from the people of Ubin their knowledge and practices concerning nature and the universe (e.g their knowledge of the various plants and their uses, and their skills to repair and maintain their houses, eke out a living)
- 3. experience the *kampung* spirit through conversations with Ubin villagers (e.g their sharing of knowledge to foster a sense of community, building trust and intergenerational tradition of cooperation)
- 4. discuss how Ubin's living community heritage can become a cultural asset for Singaporeans and global citizens e.g achieving balance between biodiversity/heritage conservation and development.

## **Cycle of Our Landscape**

# Ethan Chung, Lim Cheng Puay & Chua Yong Liang (ex-villager)

Pulau Ubin provides a multi-faceted educational experience, and this trail covers the delicate cycle in the use of natural capital provided by Pulau Ubin and will discuss the changes seen in Pulau Ubin's natural landscape over the years. This trail will first cover the granite quarries and its post-historical use such as the rehabilitation strategies to restore the natural environment. Secondly, the mangrove ecosystem in Puaka will be introduced with focus on its biodiversity and ecosystem services. The human and physical geography of mangroves will be highlighted, from its use as a prawn farm to its rehabilitation back to a mangrove forest. From a pedagogical perspective, this trail will explore options of organising field studies and field trips to Pulau Ubin with possibilities of inquiry-based learning focusing on the lifecycle of economic activities such as prawn farming and granite quarrying. Another possible project will be the geographical investigation on mangroves and water quality of quarry lakes. Schools can explore citizen scientist projects investigating cultural and ethnographic research for the remaining structures and kampung practices. Possible ways to frame the content to make it applicable for group investigation will be discussed.

# **Learning Outcomes**

At the end of the trail experience, participants will be able to:

- 1. recognise how the natural landscape in Pulau Ubin has changed over time with the mass settlement of people to operate the granite quarries and the construction of prawn farms
- 2. understand the historical significance of granite quarries in Pulau Ubin and their impact on the natural landscape and its impact on village life
- 3. examine the strategies and methods used to rehabilitate the quarries and restore the natural environment
- 4. Identify key characteristics of the mangrove ecosystem
- 5. recognize the importance of the mangrove ecosystem in Puaka, including its biodiversity and ecosystem services
- 6. analyze the effects of prawn farms around mangroves on the local ecosystem.
- 7. examine the controversies surrounding future hi-tec aquaculture farms and the protection of mangroves and other habitats

# Synopsis for Trail: Conservation Efforts for a Biophilic City Dr Chua Ee Kiam, Philemon Foo & Jacob Tan

As one of Singapore's offshore nature sanctuaries, Pulau Ubin has been recognised as a refugia for species threatened elsewhere in the region which includes the red-jungle fowl, straw-headed bulbul, Sunda Pangolin and southern pied hornbill. And It still continues to yield surprises. Recently, a species of flower fly known as the wasp mimic that had not been sighted for almost 200 years was rediscovered here on Pulau Ubin. Ubin can certainly play a bigger role in biodiversity education and nature conservation and not merely as an island getaway for the youths. Participants would get to experience Ubin's biodiversity through the sights and sounds on this trail. They would also get to understand how the species recovery programme on Ubin targets endemic, threatened native species in Singapore through habitat enhancement projects such as the bat houses. The place can also foster a rich learning experience for students, not easily afforded elsewhere, in enhancing their understanding of ecological systems and even how they can play a role in citizen science.

# **Learning Outcomes**

At the end of the trail experience, participants will be able to:

- 1. identify some of the flora and fauna found in Chek Jawa and the different habitats coastal forest, mud flats, mangrove, rocky shores and seagrass meadows
- 2. appreciate Chek Jawa as another possible stopover for migratory birds along the East Asian-Australasian Flyway<sup>1</sup>
- 3. recognize the significant role of mangroves and coastal forests in providing ecosystem services and possible nature-based solutions to address sea level rise and climate crisis.
- 4. analyze the controversies surrounding marine foraging and coastal protection
- 5. acknowledge the role of communities in the conservation of Chek Jawa
- 6. recognize the importance of advocacy and research of SIngapore's natural landscapes with its irreplaceable habitats
- 7. debate the future of possible land reclamation on the eastern coast of Ubin

Heng Leun's contributions to the arts have landed him awards from the National Arts Council, Singapore – the Young Artist Award (2000), Cultural Fellowship (2014), and the highest artistic accolade, the Cultural Medallion (2022). He also served as a Nominated Member of Parliament from 2016 to 2018, representing the arts sector.

Heng Leun is currently working on a multi-years arts-based project called Project 12, that will happen in Ubin. The project will embed artists in Ubin so that artists will engage living sentients and non-living resources of Pulau Ubin, to research and create works that will explore the idea of ecological sustainability.



#### **Dr Vivienne Wee**

Vivienne Wee is an anthropologist and a public intellectual who has been doing research on the cultural heritage of Pulau Ubin since 2015. She is an active member of 'Kawan Ubin', a project of Friends of Ubin (FUN), which is a network of Singaporeans concerned about Ubin. She is currently Associate Faculty at the Singapore University of Social Sciences (SUSS). Her anthropological research spans Singapore and Indonesia, especially the Riau Archipelago. She obtained her PhD in Anthropology from the Australian National University, MSocSc in Sociology from the (then) University of Singapore, and Bachelor's degrees in Music and Anthropology from the University of Minnesota. She previously lectured at the National University of Singapore, The Chinese University of Hong Kong and City University of Hong Kong.
