



























## **Teaching Notes and Ideas**

### **Multiple Choice Questions**

Teachers can quiz their students on these learning points after reading the book together. For simplicity, two choices are given for each answer. The correct answer is in green.

Teachers can elaborate on the reasons behind the correct answers, which are provided below.

- If we see a wild boar, should we (a) shout really loudly or (b) be quiet, stand at a distance and calmly observe?
- When monkeys are hungry, should we (a) feed the monkeys or (b) leave them to find their own food in the trees?
- If we see otters, should we (a) go really close and take selfies or (b) watch them from a safe distance?
- If we see a snake on the path, should we (a) walk away from the snake, slowly and quietly or (b) stomp our feet and chase the snake away?
- In Singapore, by 2030, do we want to plant (a) one thousand more trees or (b) one million more trees?
- If we plant more trees, do they make our air (a) better or (b) worse?
- If we plant more trees, do they make our parks (a) messier or (b) greener?
- In Singapore, should we plant (a) more trees or (b) fewer trees?

### Follow-up Questions

Q: Why should we stay nice and quiet in Nature Parks?

A: Nature Parks are quiet places for people and wildlife to relax and enjoy the peaceful green spaces. Nature Parks also help to protect the wildlife living in the Nature Reserves. By keeping our volume down, we are respecting the other visitors and wildlife.

Q: Why should we keep a safe distance from wildlife?

A: They want to keep themselves and their families safe and may feel threatened if we come too close.

Q: Why should we not feed monkeys?

A: They have enough food in the trees. Human food can be harmful for monkeys. Human food can also encourage monkeys to interact with people, which may be dangerous for both monkeys and humans. Also, the forests benefit when monkeys eat their fruits and spread the seeds around. Then, other fruits can grow!

Q: Why should we plant more trees?

A :They help to make the air cleaner. They provide homes and shelter for wildlife. Trees also make our parks greener and are an important part of our City in Nature.

Q: Why are trees so important?

A: They provide wildlife with food and shelter. They give us shade. They make our City in Nature cooler. They make the air cleaner. They make Singapore greener. They make our surroundings beautiful.

#### Fun Facts about the OneMillionTrees Movement

- The OneMillionTrees movement aims to plant a million more trees across Singapore by 2030.
- In 2030, there will be more than eight million trees in Singapore!
- The trees will be planted all over Singapore, including along our streets and in our gardens, parks, Nature Reserves and Nature Parks.
- NParks, which looks after our green spaces, is working with the community which includes volunteers, schools, gardeners, nature groups, corporate partners and other organisations to plant the trees.
- The OneMillionTrees movement is one way to achieve our vision of making Singapore a City in Nature, where we live together with all our wildlife, safely and peacefully.

#### Suggested Activities

- In a role-playing exercise, children can act out key scenes in the book, taking turns to play
  different animals to act out the right and wrong ways to behave. E.g. Feed the animals and
  it all goes wrong! Do not feed the animals and it all goes right!
- Play a What Am I game with different animals. E.g. I play in the trees. I have a long tail. I like to eat the fruits and leaves in trees. You should not feed me. What am I? A monkey!
